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Elmira students flee to other schools

Since the beginning of Open Enrollment, Elmira has lost numerous students to rival schools such as Triangle Lake. District officials are concerned over the loss of both students and money from the only school in the area that consistently receives a rank of "Outstanding." One question is larger than the others: Why are these students leaving? What do all of these schools have that we do not?

"I think the lack of vocational classes is absolutely a reason," said Forrest Cooper, math teacher. "The lack of students isn't noticeable because many of them never come here in the first place—Willamette Leadership buses a number of its students



from our district [to Goshen], and now students can just stay home and take online classes." The decline of vocational classes at EHS has been a longtime

process, with the woodworking and shop classes eventually being cut entirely, leaving students no place to go but West Lane

Technical Learning Facility, which fortunately still has its own auto and electric vehicle classes. However, besides that there aren't any vocational classes at EHS. There is also no longer a drama or band class here, with drama being cut long ago and band being cut two years ago.

"We definitely need more vocational classes... a lot of them have been cut; we used to have a band program and woodshop and I think we even used to have metal shop. Now all we have is auto and choir," said Mason Beebe, jr. *-By Jeremy Cooper*

Counselors prepare for unique experience at outdoor school

Applications to become an Outdoor School counselor for 2014 were turned in to Meagan Haas on March 17. Interviews with Bob Bruce, Laurie Doshier, and new coordinator, Kate Klein, took place a week later. Each student got five minutes to talk to the three advisors. Klein has joined the Outdoor School team this year to eventually move in when Bob Bruce retires and hands the position over to her.

Boys applied less this year than in past years. There were 14 applications with 12 spots to be filled. The girls had many more applications, with 30 applications to fill 12 spots. Counselors who were selected will be attending weekly training sessions beginning Wed. April 9 and ending May 14.

Counselors will have to pick out camp names, plan activities for campers and split into groups and plan out lessons for the different field study groups that include Nature Walk, Rotten, Squid, First Aid, and Orienteering. Groups consist of four counselors, two boys and two girls. The field study sessions last for one and half hours.

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NEWS Test standards change for underclassmen

Testing is getting easier... and harder? The College Board is "dumbing down" the SAT.

Some of the more complex vocabulary words are being removed, as well as the formerly mandatory essay, which will be optional and will come with its own separate score. Math is being made easier, and points are no longer taken off for wrong answers.

The new SAT will be released in March 2016. Current ninth graders will be the first students to take the new SAT. 2,400 is a perfect score but it will be lowered to 1,600 with the new SAT.

"They aren't helping anyone by lowering the bar. It just makes students think they don't have to work hard," said Jasmine Garcia, soph.

On the other end of the spectrum, however, is the new Smarter Balanced testing, which is replacing the OAKS testing that students complete during their junior year. Smarter Balanced will be more difficult.

"It's a pointless change from the OAKS and I don't personally like it," said Michael Taylor, soph.

This new test will be harder and more in depth. On math problems, students will now be required to show their work and methods.

"The Smarter Balanced Test is a lot more

difficult," said Krin Hunt, who was at a Smarter Balanced Workshop in California. "It has a lot of Algebra 2 concepts in there, so if you haven't had Algebra 2 it could be hard."

In the reading sections, a question may ask a student to draw a conclusion about a poem and use examples to support their answer.

"They lowered the SAT standards and I think that counters the Smarter Balanced test," said Adreanna Jones, soph.

There are currently 23 states using the Smarter Balanced testing but there may be more to follow. This year's current sophomores will be the first to take the Smarter Balanced test.

except summer," said Jasmine Barret- Garma, soph.

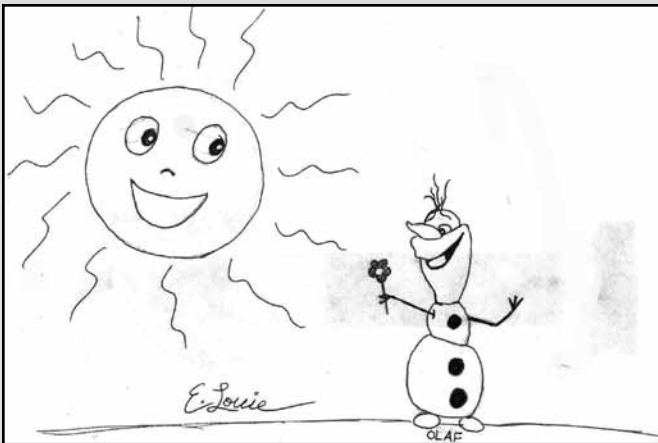
Teachers even become excited to see the suns bright, beautiful light again.

added via funding from the Project Oregon Observation Panel.

In order to prepare the teachers for the delicate job of observation, teachers will receive training from the Public Education for Restroom Vandalism Examination Relief Team, a small volunteer group that travels the country trying to assure that the teachers know how to use the cameras and avoid lawsuits.

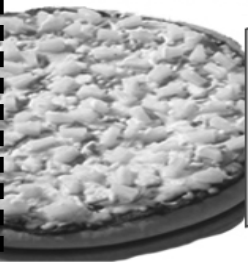
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
