Online differs from real life

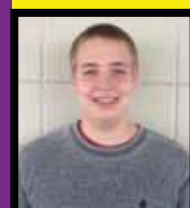

Instagram catapults people to stardom

Instagram, a social networking site that allows people to post and share photos and videos with others, has about 150 million active users monthly from all around the world, some of whom are famous.

For the people who know about and have Instagram, has anyone ever wondered what it would be like if hundreds of people liked and commented on your photos on Instagram daily? There are people every day who get that kind of attention because they have so many followers, as many as 11,000 or more. These people have become "Insta-famous."

Sidney McCabe, 20, from Wichita, Kansas, has around 12,000 followers on Instagram.

"I had an account before the one I have now that over a period of about three years I'd accumulated 13k followers. When I remade my current account, I asked my followers from my first one to follow it. I got several thousand from just the rollover onto my new account and I keep it up the same way I did on my first account," said McCabe. She gets comments of all kinds on her posts. Her reaction to the comments depends on what kind of comments they are.

"If they're sweet, I try to keep up with all of them and thank them. If they're questions, I do my best to answer them. And if they're rude insults, I either delete them or reply and correct what they're saying (nicely if I can). Every couple days I do get hate comments," said McCabe.

She said there are many positive and negative effects that come with the fame.

"The pros: You always have people who have your back and talk to you

when someone to listen and you need feel relatively important, I suppose.

The cons: There's always someone watching and waiting to make you feel bad. Anything and everything about yourself, your appearance, and your personality are criticized by people who have no idea who you are. You have to learn to have tough skin and



not take anything to heart because you're just a person on the internet with a lot of followers," said McCabe. McCabe said her fame doesn't make her feel any different than it did before she started her account, but it's definitely neat.

Alec Johnson, @aleccjohnson, 16, lives in Sheridan, Oregon, and has over 35,000 followers.

"I made my Instagram last year around my birthday. I really didn't think I'd get any followers. Then I started talking to Sam [@samon-

stage_lyrics]; at the time she had 130k followers. She would mention me a lot, so that's one of the ways I started growing. Then she posted a picture about me that hit the pop page so a lot came from that. I was pretty close to 10k at the time. Then randomly this Instagram famous guy was like 'I'm going to get you to 10k, you deserve

it. And I think from about 15k I started telling my followers to follow a person and they would tell them to follow me which made me gain incredibly. Here and there I've met 'Instagram famous' people who have helped me as well, but ever since I've been doing it on my own," said Johnson. Johnson agrees with McCabe that he gets all kind of comments from followers.

"Honestly, what they comment on my photos leaves me completely speechless. Being told that I'm perfect and flawless everyday has brought my self-esteem up so much, which is one of the reasons I love having Instagram. Sometimes it's crazy to know that some girls 'fan girl' over me. It feels so surreal, like I'm in a dream. In getting all the good comments, I get hate comments all the time. People have said pretty hurtful things. I'm not going to say it doesn't get to me because it does, but after I

read the sweet comments, it makes me feel better," said Johnson.

Johnson said there are many good things about the Insta-fame. According to him the sweet comments are the best because they make him feel ten times better about himself. He also says being able to talk to his followers make him happy. Johnson said that he doesn't like having people at school know about his account.

Alina Bogachuk, @leiartista, 16, lives in Washington and has over 122,000 followers on her famous art account. "I started my account about two summers ago, like 2012," said Bogachuk. She says she doesn't consider herself famous, and she didn't expect her account to be so popular. Once she gained 100 followers, though she knew her account and future would expand.

Most of the people Bogachuk know are aware of her account. She said her parents think it's cool that she posts her art, but they're not too interested in the account itself. She also gets support from friends and family. She says that Instagram has given her many opportunities with business and companies. She has started selling her art as her passion grew larger.

"I like Instagram because it allows people to express what they feel through a photo," said Cassidy Johnson, fr. "Also, you can see what other people are doing in life without being creepy about it!"

Insta-fame has its perks, but in the end, school ultimately comes first. Perhaps school work should take precedence over before social networking

COOK'S CORNER: MINT CHOCOLATE CHIP CHEESECAKE BROWNIES

Ingredients:

For the brownies:

- 1/2 cup (1 stick) salted butter
- 8 ounces coarsely chopped semi-sweet chocolate
- 1 1/4 cups sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

For the mint cheesecake layer:

- 8 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- 1/4 teaspoon peppermint extract
- 2 drops liquid or gel green food coloring
- 2/3 cup mini chocolate chips



Directions:

Make the brownies first: melt butter and semi-sweet chocolate in a medium saucepan on medium heat, stirring constantly (about 6 minutes). Remove from heat and let cool to room temperature (about 15 minutes). You may also stick the

chocolate/butter mixture into the refrigerator to cool to room temperature quicker.

Stir sugar into cooled chocolate/butter mixture until combined. Add the eggs one at a time, whisking until smooth after each addition. Whisk in the vanilla. Gently fold in the flour and salt. Pour batter into prepared pan, reserving 1/4 cup of batter.

Make the cheesecake swirl: With a hand-held mixer on medium speed, beat the softened cream cheese, sugar, egg yolk, peppermint extract, and food coloring in a medium bowl until completely smooth—about 1 minute. Manually stir in the mini chocolate chips. Dollop spoonfuls of the cream cheese mixture on top of the prepared brownie batter. Cover with the last 1/4 cup of brownie batter. Glide a knife through the layers, creating a swirly pattern.

Bake brownies for 30-35 minutes

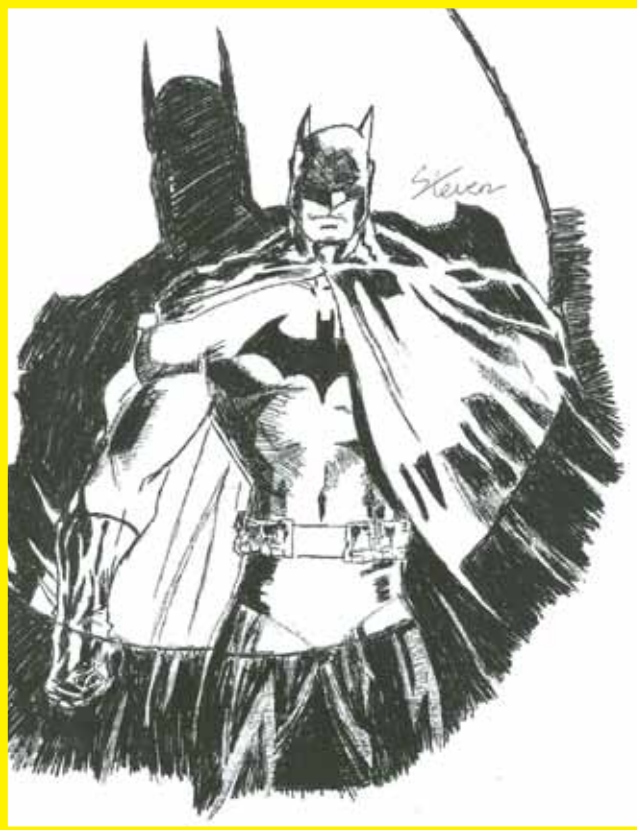
