New construction will change face of school

Elmira High School will have a new face by next school year. With a bond passed by Fern Ridge voters, the entire school district received money for renovations. Veneta Elementary, Elmira Elementary, Fern Ridge Middle School, and Elmira High School either have gone through construction, in the process of construction, or are still in waiting for their turn.

Of course, with new buildings come many problems and obstacles. "Biggest was getting it [bond] passed," said Gary Carpenter, Jr., Elmira High School principal.

The bond wasn't up to the school district; in fact, the vote was up to the residents of the Fern Ridge area. Supporters of the bond, mostly consisting of parents and Fern Ridge School District staff, spread news about the bond. Before it passed, supporters would stand on the street corners with signs, encouraging voters to pass the bond. Before it was passed, it had been tried two other times.

Elmira High School is adding a second gym, updating the girl's

locker room, and extending the lobby.

"I think it's going great. It took a while to get the bond passed, but I hope in the next 20-30-40 or so years we will really get some

use out of it," said Carpenter.

Currently, there is only one gym. Carpenter said that having one gym makes it difficult for our sports teams. Junior varsity basketball teams have to play at Fern Ridge Middle School because

the high school lacks the proper gym space. Adding another gym would allow all of the sports teams to play on campus rather than play at a different school during home games.

Although it has been a long and hard-fought journey, the school's facilities will improve. Starting on May 2, construction will begin at the high school. May 9, work will begin on the girls' locker room. On June 20, work will begin on the gym addition.

By August 15, the girls' locker room should be finished, and by December 15 the gym is also to be completed. Hopefully, the girls' locker room will be ready by the time fall sports start again, and everything should be complete by Christmas time of the 2016-2107 school year.

GBC Construction Company won the contract with the bid of \$3,586,400. The total includes the base bid of \$3,412,000 with the extended bid for the lobby of \$174,000.



Batman v. Superman: Dawn of Justice review As a Justice League fan, I was recycled from other DC story arcs, lacked any explanation whatsoever Adams both fell somewhat flat as

excited for the release of DC's latest film, but as a movie lover, I was sorely disappointed. While it is easy to forgive Zack Snyder for Man of Steel, as it is nearly impossible to make a good Superman film, I was more eager to learn that Christopher Nolan (the Dark Knight trilogy) would be an executive producer. However, Nolan's directing experience didn't seem to prevent huge questions reminiscent of the Dark Knight Rises from appearing.

Much of the movie consisted of predictable lines and plot devices

such as the Dark Knight Returns and the Death of Superman. The writers spent more time on foreshadowing the Justice League than they did on developing its characters, leaving only three disappointing cameos by Aquaman, The Flash, and Cyborg. In addition, they did everything in their power to avoid an obvious Darkseid name drop. While Superman's character had already been thoroughly set up by Man of Steel, Batman had just enough character development to show his motivation. Wonder Woman's first big screen appearance

until the very end of the film.

Most of the actors portrayed their characters very well throughout the film, if a little differently than usual. Henry Caville's Superman, while taking a lot of criticism after Man of Steel, took a convincingly dark twist on truth, justice, and the American way. Ben Affleck did an amazing job as Batman and Bruce Wayne, more than atoning for his performance in Daredevil. Jesse Eisenberg's Lex Luthor had great potential, which was squandered by the writers' portrayal of the character. Gal Gadot and Amy

Wonder Woman/Diana Prince and Lois Lane, respectively.

Batman v. Superman, while clearly meant to stand apart from the more lighthearted, family friendly Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU), was essentially a rushed attempt to catch up with the MCU without putting in the time, resources, or effort that Marvel has displayed since the release of Iron Man in 2008. The movie received a 29 percent rating on Rotten Tomatoes, giving it a solid F.

SAT, AP testing begins in May, June

SAT and AP testing start next month. This is a time where senior and junior study for their future. On June 4, SAT testing will begin at seven a.m. at the EHS cafeteria. The AP testing will begin May 2 and will go through May 11.

SAT is a now newly redesigned. It was redesigned to keep up with the ACT testing. ACT is a test that most students are getting a higher score on than the SAT. SAT, though, has been the number one choice for colleges to look at testing.

This new test includes reading, writing math, and an optional essay. In the new test, the new sections are longer. The reading test students will get sixty-five minutes, the writing test students get thirty-five minutes, the math test will get eighty minutes (twenty-five minutes for no calculators and fifty-five minutes with calculators), and students get fifty minutes on optional test. This new test is closely similar to the ACT test. There is one downside to the new SAT test we have to wait to see how students do on this test in order to decide if it is working.

Why should students take the SAT test? Some colleges require the SAT subject testing. Even if the colleges don't require the SAT testing, they use the scores to get a better idea of the applicants. The AP test subject depends on what class these students are taking. If you score a three or higher on the test for that class; you have earned a college credit for that class.

"The whole year is preparing for the AP test. On own their though, they should take a look at the literary terms they learned throughout the year. Also reading on the side will help," Shannon Hart, AP English Literature teacher, said.

Students can prepare for these tests by studying. There are study guides for available students. SAT also provides practice test day, it is like the real test but the score does not count.

AP classes are college courses offered on high school campus. Students prepare all school year for the exams and teachers who teach AP classes must submit

their courses to the College Board for audit before they can teach the courses. Most AP classes use practice tests and write essays all year to prepare for the exam.

To take the test, there is a payment for the test. The average SAT test cost \$52 but there are waivers to fill out to reduce or eliminate the fee. On the other hand the average cost for AP test is \$59. If students qualify for free or reduce lunch, then your AP test can be free or reduced priced.

As the testing comes closer, students should study and be prepared for a long day of testing.

Time to plant the perfect garden



How to get a job as an inexperienced worker



As the end of high school draws nearer, the pressure to find a job becomes more of an issue. Finding a job requires a lot of time and patience, but the more work the more results a person will get.

Writing a résumé does not have to be as complicated as it sounds; in fact, it should be easy and simple to read as employers do not have the time to contemplate every detail.

The most important information and categories, such as contact information, should be located and emphasized at the top of the page.

The best way to keep a résumé simple and pleasing to look at is to break things down into categories and use bullet points. The categories could be things such as, education, awards and honors, volunteer and community service, language and intercultural services (if any), life skills, hobbies, and goals.

When filling out an application, Dairy Queen owner, Allen Johnson, likes to see that it is filled out neatly. Johnson and the assistant manager of Ray's, Joe Fleshman, also likes to see that the application is filled out completely.

Johnson also said that he wants people who are presentable and work well with people.

A résumé should illustrate where a person is now, where that person has been, and where they are trying to get to, but it doesn't need to be more than a page.

A persons résumé should be up-to-date and tailored to the kind of job they want to get. If that person is trying to get a job at a pet store, they may not want to talk about how they were captain of the soccer team or was a member of the pickleball team, but instead mention the time they spent the summer with their veterinarian uncle as his assistant.

Stay away from statements that a mom would say, such as "I'm a good listener" or "I have many different talents," instead use examples and evidence that speaks for itself. "I can type 60 words per minute with few errors."

There are ways to improve a résumé before even having a paying job. People are often interested in the work you've done in school, such as your GPA, or the amount of volunteer work you've done. There are plenty of places to volunteer in Lane County, such as the Food for Lane County food kitchen, or you could join Key Club.

Volunteering and being involved could lead to a job in other ways, networking. Networking is when someone exchange information with new people and create more contacts, which is important in making someone known in the job market.

If at first students can't find a job, they shouldn't give up; they should ask businesses why they weren't hired so that they can get feedback on how to improve their résumé. They may be surprised by the tenacity and reconsider hiring them.

If the first job isn't a dream job, don't give up. Continue to find ways to get hired in a field of interest. Even though a person may not be passionate about their current job, it is important to do it well and have a good reputation among employers.

Going to college and working would be harder considering the

time he has to be at school. "I will only work if I have to," said Welty.

Jobs that do not require a college degree or a high school diploma are mainly fast food restaurants. "I will work at McDonalds while I am going through college," said Brandon Pew, fr.

Having a job while going through college can be temporary if you want a job that is based off your degree. "I am only going to work at McDonalds while I am going to college," said Pew.

Others can get a job that requires a diploma just by someone they know that is working there or somewhere in the business line. "I am working at an elderly foster home because I have a family member who is one of the residences," said Kelsie Bowman, sr. Bowman plans to work at the elderly foster home until she has a stable job that works for her.

Working at an elderly foster home can be hard to find time to do homework. "I work on the weekends and go to school during the week. I also have down time at work. I can work on homework," said Bowman.

Working after high school, may require a college education, or it may not. Finding the right job is important either way.

Pro-life and pro-choice are two different perspectives on the divisive topic of abortion. Both of these perspectives have many followers, regardless of age, gender, or location. Those who are pro-life oppose abortion. Those who are pro-choice believe that it is the fundamental right of a woman to choose to abort her fetus or continue with the pregnancy.

Many people support both perspectives; however, the rising protests cause a debate.

Pro-life supporters post on social media the reasons for being pro-life supporters, and pro-choice supporters disgrace them, saying that they are wrong in their perspectives about abortion.

Pro-choice supporters suggest

that a fetus is not a human being because they are completely dependent on the mother, that the fetus cannot be called a human being because it is not independent whatsoever.

"I cannot understand anti-abortion arguments that center on the sanctity of life. As a species we've fairly comprehensively demonstrated that we don't believe in the sanctity of life. The shrugging acceptance of war, famine, epidemic, pain, and life-long poverty shows us that, whatever we tell ourselves, we've made only the most feeble of efforts to really treat human life as sacred," said Caitlin Moran, journalist, author, and broadcaster at The Times.

Pro-choice supporters suggest

while pro-life supporters state that it is not the fetus' fault at all. In fact, the fetus is not able to harm its mother; it is the mother's reaction to being pregnant. The fetus actually does develop its own placenta; therefore, it is independent from its mother. The fetus does rely on the mother for nourishment, but that does not necessarily make it dependent.

Protests of abortion and its procedures happen in front of the Eugene Planned Parenthood on Franklin Boulevard.

"I'm disturbed by the fact that our society should encourage mothers to kill and then harvest the body parts of their unborn children. It seems to me unthinkable. Yet, here we are. The most dangerous place to be in America is a mother's womb," said Timothy McDonald, protester at Planned Parenthood.

Currently, US Supreme Court's 7-2 decision on Roe v. Wade, states that "personhood begins after a fetus becomes "viable" (able to survive outside the womb) or after birth, not at conception." Another view about the fetus is that life begins at contraception; therefore, the unborn are human beings with a fundamental right to live.

Pro-life and Pro-choice supporters are very important to the rights and decisions made about the subject of abortion.

Q. What is your main sport? **A.** Equestrian, but I am doing track, too.

O. What is involved with your sport, equestrian? **A.** It takes a lot of free time, and we have to get our horses ready before a practice starts.

Q. What do you mean by "get ready"?

A. We have to usually take their blankets off, brush them and then tack them (put on saddles and bridles), and then we have to warm the horse up before practice even starts. Warming the horse up means walking, trotting, and loping them. All of these things must be done before we can practice.

Q. How much money is invested in this sport? **A.** We have to pay for the horse's food, arena fees each time we practice, which is two or three times a week. Usually the fees are \$10.00 per practice or \$100.00 for unlimited practice a month. Equipment such as, ropes, saddles, bits, helmets, boots - out-ofpocket expenses- must be bought when needed. Horses vary in cost; some are bought and some are leased. The bond between horse and rider is more important than the cost of the horse.

Q. How long have you been riding? A. I have been riding since I was "two-ish."


Q. Why have you stuck with this sport for so long? **A.** It's something that I enjoy doing, and my family is involved a lot in it.

Cook's Corner



Dinner Rolls

4 ¼ to 4 ¾ cups all-purpose flour 1 package active dry yeast

1 cup milk

1/3 cup sugar

1/3 cup shortening, margarine, or butter

½ teaspoon salt

2 eggs

Oven 375

Combine 2 cups of the flour and the yeast. Heat and stir milk, sugar, shortening, and salt just till warm (120 degrees to 130 degrees) and shortening almost melts. Add to flour mixture along with eggs. Beat with an electric mixer on low speed for 30 seconds, scraping bowl constantly. Beat on high speed for 3 minutes. Using a spoon, stir in as much of the remaining flour as you can.

Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface. Knead in enough remaining flour to make a moderately stiff dough that is smooth and elastic (6 to 8 minutes total). Shape dough into a ball. Place dough in a greased bowl; turn once to grease surface. Cover and let rise in a warm place till double (about 1 hour). Punch dough down. Turn out onto a lightly floured surface. Divide dough in half. Cover and let rest for 10 minutes. Shape the dough into desired rolls. Cover and let rise in a warm place till nearly double (about 30 min-

Bake in a 375 degree oven for 12 to 15 minutes or till golden brown. Makes 24 to 32 rolls.
