VOCATIONAL/TECHNICAL SCHOOLS

- Certification
 - Combination of Hands-on-Training + Academics
- Admission process varies
- Examples of Field of Training Include:
 - Diesel Mechanic
 - Cosmetology
 - Nursing
 - Construction, Electrician, Sheet Metal Apprenticeships
 - Veterinary Tech

COMMUNITY COLLEGES (2-YEAR PUBLIC COLLEGES)

- Degree Awarded:
 - Associate Degree
 - Certificate of Completion
- Open Enrollment
 - Accept all students
- Student can prepare for transfer to 4-year school
- Rolling Admissions
 - Spring, Summer, Fall
- Placement tests in Math, Reading & Writing
- TUITION IS LESS!
 - 12 Credits (Tuition + Fees): UO = \$3,000 LCC = \$1,400

4-YEAR PUBLIC COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES

- Degrees Offered:
 - Baccalaureate -> Masters -> Doctorate
- Enrollment Varies: 3,000-23,000+ students
- Must Meet Admission Requirements
- SAT or ACT Test Required
- Complete Application By a Specific Date
- Only a Percentage of Applicants are Admitted

OREGON PUBLIC UNIVERSITY ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

English: 4 Years

Math: 3 Years*

Science: 3 Years

Social Studies: 3 Years

Second Language: 2 Years**

- Minimum required GPA is 2.75-3.0 (unweighted)
- Grades earned must be a C- or above
- *Algebra 1, Geometry, and Algebra 2 and above
- ** Two Years of the SAME language

4-YEAR PRIVATE COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES

- Degrees Awarded:
 - Baccalaureate -> Masters -> Doctorate
- Must Meet Admissions Requirements
- SAT or ACT Required; SAT Subjects Test may be required
- May Require
 - Recommendations
 - Special Essays
 - Interviews
 - Supplemental Financial Aid Form

OUT-OF-STATE OPPORTUNITIES

- Over 4,000 Colleges and Universities Nationwide
- Requirements vary greatly; check each school's requirements and deadlines
- Requirements may change annually; seek current information

WESTERN UNDERGRADUATE EXCHANGE (WUE "WOO-WEE")

- Through WUE, students in western states may enroll in many two year and four year college programs at a reduced tuition level: 150% of the institution's regular resident tuition. WUE tuition is considerably less than non resident tuition.

MILITARY

- Options: Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, National Guard, U.S. Coast Guard
- Military Academies
 - Air Force Academy
 - Naval Academy
 - West Point
 - U.S. Coast Guard Academy
 - U.S. Merchant Marine Academy
 - Colleges and Universities: ROTC Programs (Req. SAT/ACT)
- General Enlistment Requirements:
 - Good Health, At last 17 years Old, U.S. Citizen or Green Card Holder, H.S. Diploma (some branches accept GED), Pass the ASVAB (Career Aptitude Test)




TESTING!

- SAT/ACT
 - Given multiple times each year
 - Required by OUS Schools and Private Schools
 - Required by some scholarship programs
 - CC's may accept scores in lieu of placement tests
- SAT Subject Tests
 - Given same time as SAT tests
 - Required by some private and more selective public institutions

COLLEGE SELECTION & APPLICATION PROCESS



POST-SECONDARY SELECTION PROCESS THINGS TO CONSIDER

- Campus & Community Personality
 - Discuss campus life and culture with former and current students, arrange a visit, What are other students like? Political/Religious philosophy?
- Cost
 - See Cost Of Tuition and Fees for Public Oregon Colleges worksheet
 - Scholarships, grants, tuition waivers—ways to reduce cost. Take the time to apply for as many opportunities as possible
- Geographic Location and Campus Size
 - Proximity to home, Large vs. Small size, urban vs. small-town setting

CAMPUS VISITS

- How? Contact the admissions office to set-up an appointment
- When? Start visiting the summer before Senior Year— Visits are even more productive when classes are in session
- What? Ask to see areas of interest such as an art studio, chemistry lab, or housing
- Why? It is important to visit a campus before you enroll—you will potentially be spending the next 4 years there!! Every campus feels different.

WHERE TO GET APPLICATIONS

- Visit school admissions website. Most colleges use an online application only.
- Common Application may reduce workload:
 - Allows you to apply to multiple colleges with one application

- Helpful Hints:
 - Read instructions carefully—TWICE!!
 - Proofread all applications before sending
 - Keep copies of everything submitted!

AVERAGE COST OF ATTENDANCE PER YEAR

- Oregon Private Colleges: \$49,500
- Oregon Public Colleges: \$27,400
- Community Colleges: \$19,400
- Vocational/Technical Programs: Varies Widely

FUNDING A COLLEGE EDUCATION



FINANCIAL AID

- Where does financial aid come from?
 - Federal Government
 - Grants, Work Study, Loans → FAFSA to apply
 - State Government
 - Don't qualify for federal aid or small amount?
 - www.ed.gov/sgt
 - From the college itself
 - Offer financial aid from their own funds
 - FAFSA Form—automatically apply for aid from state and institutions listed on FAFSA

FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA)

- How to Apply? You must apply through FAFSA!
 www.fafsa.ed.gov
 - Students AND Parents apply for FSA ID → Electronic signature used to access your financial aid info.
 - Studentaid.gov/fsaid
- When should I apply?
 - Each October, form is available for the next school year
 - Reapply for aid every year you are in school
- Basic Eligibility
 - See Federal Student Aid Worksheet

FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA)

- What do you need to complete the FAFSA?
 - 1. Federal income tax returns—w-2s, and other records of money earned
 - 2. Social Security Number
 - 3. Bank Statements—savings and checking account balances
 - 4. List of schools that you plan to attend—you can list up to 10
 - 5. Records of untaxed income—child support, interest income, and veterans non-education benefits
 - 6. FSA ID

TYPES OF AID

- Federal Grants: Money that does not have to be paid back! Apply for the following via FAFSA...
 - Federal Pell Grant (\$6,095)
 - Federal Suppl. Edu Opp. Grant (\$4,000)
 - Iraq and Afghanistan Service Grant (\$6,095)
 - Teach Grant (\$4,000)
 - See Federal Student Aid Worksheet for more details
- Federal Work-Study: Money is earned through a job and doesn't have to be repaid. Award depends on:
 - When you apply, level of financial need, school's funding

TYPES OF AID

- Federal Student Loans: These are loans, and MUST be repaid
 - Direct Subsidized Loans
 - Direct Unsubsidized Loans
 - Direct PLUS Loans
 - See Federal Student Aid Worksheet for more details including, who the loans are for, award amounts, and interest rate

I COMPLETED THE FAFSA, NOW WHAT?

- After you submit your FAFSA, you will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) that summarizes the data you submitted
 - If you fill out the FAFSA form online and provide your email address, you will receive a SAR within 3 days.
- Carefully review SAR for any mistakes
 - No mistakes? Keep for your records
 - Mistakes? Or Update? Studentaid.gov/fafsa/next-steps/accept-aid
- The information in your SAR will be provided to the schools you listed on your FAFSA form.
- You will receive an aid offer from the schools at which you were accepted for admission

AID OFFER AND AMOUNT

- The aid offer will tell you how much aid you're eligible to receive, types of aids, and amounts of aid from Federal, State, private and school sources.
- How much aid you receive depends on the following factors:
 - Cost of Attendance (for each school)
 - Expected Family Contribution (EFC) (based on FAFSA info.)
 - Year in school
 - Enrollment status (e.g., full-time, half-time)
- Compare school aid offers. Which is most affordable? Which is a BEST fit for you?
- Only borrow what you NEED and what you can afford to pay back!

SCHOLARSHIPS (FREE MONEY!)

- Forms of Scholarships:
 - Need Based and Merit Based, or Combination
 - Institutional and Private
- Prioritize Scholarships
 - 1. Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
 - 2. School-Based Scholarships, OSAC, and Local Scholarship Opportunities (College and Career Website)
 - 3. All other scholarship opportunities
 - Fastweb, Cappex, Unigo, Big Future

OREGON STUDENT ACCESS COMMISSION (OSAC)

- OSAC administers a variety of State of Oregon,
 Federal, and privately funded student financial aid programs
- Grants: Oregon Opportunity Grant, Oregon Promise Grant, Chafee Education & Training Grant, etc.
- OSAC Private Scholarships: Over 400 private scholarships offered—Criteria and award amount varies.
- Applications open November 1st, 2019 (-ish)
 - Work on Activity Chart and Personal Statements NOW! https://app.oregonstudentaid.gov/

OREGON PROMISE GRANT

- Oregon Promise is a state grant that covers a portion or all <u>tuition</u> at any Oregon community college for recent high school graduates (See Oregon Promise Info Sheet)
- Who is eligible?
 - Complete Oregon Promise application (See OSAC)
 - Complete a FAFSA application
 - Be a recent Oregon H.S. graduate (within 6 mo.)
 - Have a 2.5+ cumulative GPA
 - Be an Oregon resident for at least 12 months http://oregonstudentaid.gov/oregon-promise.aspx

WHAT DOES THE H.S. TRANSCRIPT TELL US?

- 24 Credits to Graduate from EHS
 - See: "Credit Summary: Grad. Requirements" box
 - Req., Cmp., Def.
- List of Courses Taken
 - Algebra 2
 - 2 Years of the same language
- GPA Summary
 - Weighted v. Non-Weighted
 - IMPORTANT: College Admissions, Scholarships (Free Money!)
- Essential Skill Requirements
 - Reading, Writing, Math
 - Smarter Balance, SAT, ACT (Reading & Math Only), Work Sample

PREPARING FOR SENIOR YEAR

- Review transcript and carefully select your Senior classes
- Sign-up for SAT or ACT (SAT @ EHS deadline is 5/3/19)
- Attend college fairs
- Visit colleges
- Make the most of what EHS has to offer
 - Admissions rep. visits, field trips, ASPIRE, etc.
- Use Collegeboard.org
- Opportunities booklets (Important info. all in one spot!)
- Request Letters of Recommendations early (at least 3)
 - Scholarships and College Applications
 - Request Forms are located in the Counseling Center
 - Give writers at least 3 weeks before the due date
- Work hard and visit your counselor or ASPIRE mentor regularly!

COMPETING IN ATHLETICS?

- Students wishing to participate at college level will require special attention.
- You will need to speak to your counselor for NCAA or NAIA rules and regulations.




